



WEEKLY UPDATE ON NATURAL DISASTERS IN ASEAN PLUS THREE

Indonesia

Flash floods and strong winds damaged five districts in Indonesia. As of 11 November 2025, flash floods triggered by torrential rainfall in hilly areas and strong winds swept across 13 villages in five districts of Bima Regency, West Nusa Tenggara, Indonesia. A total of 2,347 people were affected as hundreds of houses were submerged and several infrastructures were damaged. Sanggar District, the most severely affected among the five districts, was inundated by floods with four villages submerged. Flooding also occurred in two villages in Wera District, three villages in Bolo District, and two villages in Soromandi District. At the same time, strong winds struck two villages in Wawo District, damaging 15 houses. No casualties were reported in the incident.

Philippines

The Philippines faced dual disasters as Typhoon Fung-Wong hit during Kalmaegi recovery. Typhoon Fung-wong devastated the northwestern part of the Philippines on 10 November 2025 while the country was still dealing with the massive

effects of Typhoon Kalmaegi, which had left at least 224 people dead. There were reports of at least eight people killed, and more than 1.4 million people were evacuated before Typhoon Fung-wong made landfall, with about 318,000 remaining in emergency shelters. Fierce winds and heavy rain flooded at least 132 northern villages, and about 1,000 houses were damaged. Schools and most government offices were closed. More than 325 domestic and 61 international flights were cancelled, and all vessels were ordered to remain in port.

Viet Nam

Typhoon Kalmaegi claimed 5 lives in Viet Nam. As of 8 November 2025, Typhoon Kalmaegi left five people dead, three missing, and 17 injured. A total of 245 houses were destroyed, while 26,226 others were damaged or had their roofs blown off. Agricultural and aquaculture areas were also severely affected. Twenty-one boats sank and 44 others were damaged. Embankments and canals in Dak Lak and Gia Lai provinces were damaged. Landslides occurred in Quang Ngai and Gia Lai provinces. Infrastructure, including bridges, roads, and railways, was also submerged.

China

Several coastal provinces in China issued emergency alerts for typhoon Fung-wong. The State Flood Control and Drought Relief Headquarters of China on 10 November 2025 activated a Level-IV emergency response in Fujian, Guangdong, Zhejiang and Hainan as Typhoon Fung-wong approached. In response, many coastal provinces

implemented emergency measures. Guangdong Province activated a Level IV wind emergency response and was expected to experience light to heavy rainfall on 11-12 November. Fujian Province activated a Level III emergency response and was forecast to experience moderate rain in coastal areas during the same period, with some regions expected to see heavy rain or storms. Zhejiang Province also took preventive measures, including directing ships to seek shelter, suspending offshore engineering work, and closing coastal tourist attractions. Local authorities in coastal areas were instructed to monitor the situation closely.

Japan

A 6.7-magnitude earthquake triggered a tsunami advisory in Japan. On 9 November 2025, an earthquake with a magnitude of 6.7 struck off the coast of Iwate Prefecture, Japan. A tsunami advisory remained in effect for about an hour along the northern coastal region following the initial quake. Residents were warned to stay away from coastal areas due to the risk of additional tremors. A 10-centimetre tsunami was detected at Ofunato City in Iwate Prefecture and at Ominato port. The quake caused power shortage and delays to bullet train services in the area.
